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YMCA Inducts Seven New

The 42nd annual YMCA of Frederick County Alvin G. Quinn Sports Hall of Fame induction ceremony will be held Saturday, February 3rd, 2018 at 6:00 p.m. at the Downtown Y on North Market Street. Seven new inductees will be recognized:

Kelby Marie (Dutrow) Conley

Record-Setting Swimmer and Coach

At age four, Kelby began organized swimming on the Hood College Youth summer swim team and on the Frederick Area YMCA swim team. She soon started setting age group and team records. Swimming for the Frederick Area Swim Team (F.A.S.T.), she was named to the All Maryland Swim Team in 1988 and 1993. At Governor Thomas Johnson High School, she set six team records, including the 100-backstroke record that she held for 22 years. Kelby was a three-time Frederick County Female Swimmer of the Year. She earned a full scholarship to West Virginia University and was named captain in her senior year. She returned to Frederick and has coached the F.A.S.T. program for 17 years. As the coach of TJHS from 2001 to 2010, she led the Patriots to four consecutive county titles and six titles in nine years.



Megan Gebbia

Outstanding College Women's Basketball Coach

Megan was a key player on the 1989 Maryland 2A State Championship Middletown High School women's basketball team. She played college basketball at Towson University from 1990 to 1994. After graduation, she served as an assistant women's basketball coach at American University, University of Maryland-Baltimore Campus, and then Wright State. She then spent 10 years as the associate head coach at Marist College, where the team won nine Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Tournament titles. In 2007, the Red Foxes advanced to the Sweet 16 and



were ranked in the top 25 for several seasons. In 2013 she returned to American University as the head women's basketball coach and has led them to appearances in the NIT and NCAA tournaments. She was the Patriot League Coach of the Year in 2015.

Sheri Huckleberry

Outstanding Athlete, Soccer Coach, and Author

An outstanding athlete at Middletown High School, excelling in soccer, track and field, Sheri won three state discus titles; was a two-time Frederick News-Post Female Soccer Player of the Year; and was a Maryland All-State soccer honoree in 1990, 1991, and 1992. She then played soccer for four years at the nationally ranked University of Connecticut. After her college career, Sheri played semi-pro/professional soccer and in 1997 helped England's Wembley FC (England) reach the FA Cup final. A member of the U.S. Youth Soccer Olympic Development coaching staff from 1999 to 2002, she also was an assistant coach at Division I Ohio University, Ball State, and Iowa, before serving as head women's soccer coach at Marist in 2003-2004. Sheri is a national expert in the field of coaching philosophy.



Zach Jackson

One of Governor Thomas Johnson High School's Greatest Athletes

Born and raised in Frederick, Zach was one of Governor Thomas Johnson High School's greatest all-around athletes. He was a three-year starter in varsity football, and a four-year starter in varsity basketball. He was a state champion track runner and during his senior year broke the then state 3A record in the 100-yard dash. Captain of both the basketball and football teams, he played on the Patriots' 1975 state championship basketball

squad. As a receiver and defensive back, he garnered All-League and All-State honors and was awarded a full football scholarship to Syracuse University. He started for the Orange as a defensive back in his sophomore year. After serving in the Army, Zach returned to Frederick County and was the head track coach at Catoctin High School and the Silver Oak Academy.

Terence Morris

High School, College, and Professional European Basketball Star

Born in Frederick, Terence attended Governor Thomas Johnson High School, where he starred in basketball, leading the Patriots to the Maryland State 3A title in 1997. The 6-ft 9-in forward then had an outstanding four years playing for the University of Maryland, and during his senior season, helped the Terps make the NCAA Final Four. Terence was selected in the second round of the 2001 NBA draft by the Atlanta Hawks; played in 2001–2003 for the Houston Rockets; and in 2005–2006 for the Orlando Magic. Later, he continued his professional career in Europe, winning All-EuroLeague first team honors in 2008. His Maccabi Tel Aviv team made the EuroLeague finals in 2008 and he was named MVP. He was a member of FC Barcelona when they won the EuroLeague Championship in 2010.



Evan Routzahn

All-Star High School and College Football Player

As a three-year starting lineman on the Middletown football team, Evan was selected to All-Area and All-League teams and was first team All-State and All-Big School in his senior year. He was a team captain and lettered in basketball and track and field for the Knights. As a University of Virginia signee, Evan became the first MHS football player to ever receive a full Division I scholarship. He



started 39 games over four seasons for the Cavaliers, including three bowl games, was a team captain at UVA, and was twice named ALL-Academic ACC. He was selected in his senior year to play in both the Blue-Gray Senior Bowl Game and the East-West Shrine Game. He returned to Frederick County and has devoted time as an advocate for individuals with Downs Syndrome.

Kelli Dawn Summers

One of Frederick County's Best Female Athletes

Kelli was a three-sport athlete at Frederick High School, excelling in soccer, basketball, and softball. She was a first team Central Maryland Conference soccer player, a leading scorer for the Cadet basketball team, and led the softball team in their 1988 state tournament appearance in the finals. She won FHS MVP awards in both basketball and softball. At Shepherd College, Kelli was a two-time All-West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference selection in softball and led the Rams to the school's first league title. In 1991, she was the WVIAC Player of the year and, in 1999, was inducted into the Shepherd College Athletic Hall of Fame. Kelli returned to Frederick County after graduation and coached softball at her alma mater for five years. She has received several awards as an outstanding physical educator.

Blast from the Past: 20 Years Ago...

Under gray skies and on an oversized, chopped-up grass field at then Dundalk Community College some 20 years ago, Thomas Johnson High School's girls' soccer team made history.

It was the fall of 1997—Nov. 15, 1997, to be exact—when Thomas Johnson held off Fallston in the Class 4A-3A state final. That outcome came with the following historical tidbits:

- It was the first soccer state title ever won by a Frederick city school. (Thomas Johnson has added two since, one boys, one girls. Tuscarora, if you want to count that as a city school, has won four.)
- It marked the first large school (3A or 4A) soccer state title for Frederick County boys or girls. (The county has added 10 more since.)
- It made Quinn Hall of Fame member Chuck Nichols the first person to ever win MPSSAA soccer states title as both a player (1973 with Middletown) and a coach. (He has added three more coaching titles since.)
- That Thomas Johnson team featured Samantha Meyers, who scored a goal and assisted the game winner in the state final. Meyers, in 1997, was the first Frederick County player to win Gatorade State Player of the Year and MACS State Player of Year honors, that on the heels of becoming the first county player to play for the U.S. Soccer Under-16 National Team. Meyers went on to a standout career at the University of Minnesota, where she was an All-Big 10 performer. (Since then Frederick County has produced an Under-17 National Team captain, and hundreds of NCAA Division I-bound players.)

After the state final match, Nichols said of Frederick County soccer, "We're not gun rack, fishing pole, no plumbing — back woods ... We beat Liberty [1996 3A-2A state champion], Severna Park [1995 4A-3A state champion] and Fallston [1996 4A-3A state champion] in three straight games. The significance of that hasn't hit me yet."

Well, 20 years later, the significance is obvious: that result in Dundalk and that Thomas Johnson girls' team helped change the soccer culture in Frederick County, and now every year a number of Frederick County teams are state title challengers.



AROUND 1997

While we're wrapping up the end of 2017, a 20-year look back seems on point.

Here are some other significant events in 1997:

- Frederick High saw the end of a record girls swimming win streak that stands today. On Dec. 8, 1997, the Cadets lost, its first defeat since Feb. 10, 1983, to end a run of 137 consecutive dual meet victories—at the time the third-longest win streak in U.S. history.
- Catoclin's Kathy Messner, another Quinn Hall of Fame member, broke the county record with a 5-foot-9 high jump. She was the first county girl to ever clear 5-7 in a meet.

Also during the spring of 1997, Frederick standout Val Williams recorded a triple jump of 42 feet, 8.5 inches, which not only was a county record, it also was among the nation's top high school performances that spring.

- Linganore's girls' basketball team saw its county record win streak come to an end in 1997, a streak that covered two-plus seasons and totaled 55 straight games.

1997 also marked the end of the high school basketball career for 2017 Quinn inductee Terence Morris, who went on to play professionally in the NBA and in Europe, and it was the beginning of the high school record-setting career of 2012 Quinn inductee Zach Mills, who went on to stand out at Penn State.

An Umpire During the Early Days of Baseball

From 1915 until 1932 Richard Nallin of Frederick had a rather unique career as an American League umpire.

He was behind the plate for back-to-back no-hitters in 1917.

He umpired in four World Series, including the infamous Black Sox Scandal World Series of 1919.

The longtime county resident was the originator of the multiple umpiring system and the first umpire to work a game at third base. He was considered one of baseball's greatest "take charge" umpires.

Nallin was the home plate umpire during Ty Cobb's final game on Sept. 11, 1928. He reportedly was a respected friend of both Ty Cobb and Babe Ruth, two vastly different personalities.

When Nallin died, he was featured in a story that appeared in the New York Times.

It's no wonder that, in 1979, Nallin was selected to the Alvin G. Quinn Frederick County Sports Hall of Fame.

Nallin, who died in Frederick in 1956 at the age of 78, was born in Scranton, Pa., in 1877, but spent most of his life in Frederick.

He played baseball and football at Villanova University in the late 1890s and had a 7-2-1 record as the team's head football coach in 1899.

But he then concentrated on baseball, playing minor league ball in the early 20th century. He was a first baseman and pitcher.

Nallin first came to Frederick in 1908 to play for an independent team.

He began umpiring minor league games about 1911 (first in the Connecticut League before jumping to the International League in 1912), at a time when players were picked to call games when regular



officials did not show up. In 1915 he began his major league umpiring career.

Four years later he was an umpire in the 1919 World Series between the Chicago White Sox and Cincinnati Reds. The Reds won the championship, five games to three, in the best of nine series. Later, eight members of the White Sox were charged with intentionally losing games in exchange for money from gamblers.

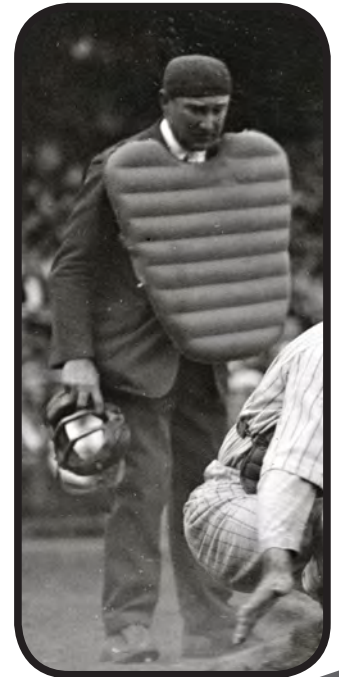
According to published reports, Nallin said he "had no suspicion" of any wrongdoing.

On May 5, 1917, he was behind the plate when Ernie Koob of the old St. Louis Browns pitched a no-hitter. The very next day he was the home plate umpire when the Browns' Bob Groom threw a no-hitter.

On April 30, 1922, he was also behind the plate when Charlie Robertson of the Chicago White Sox threw the fifth perfect game in major league history.

Nallin finished his umpiring career in the International League in 1933 and 1934.

He then concentrated on working on his farm in Frederick County.

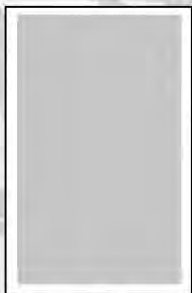

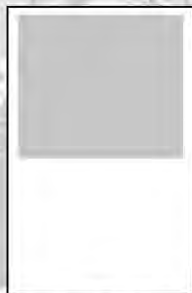
