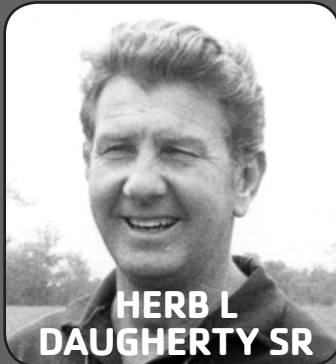

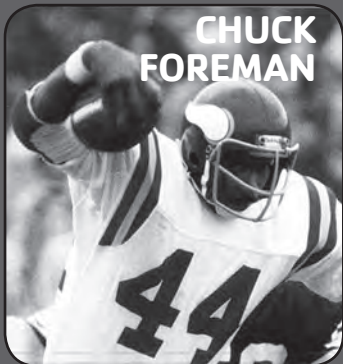

The Can-Do Man

The plaque for Herb L. Daugherty Sr. that hangs in the Hall of Fame Room at the Young Men's Christian Association describes him as the "Can-Do Man."

Daugherty was posthumously inducted into the Alvin G. Quinn Sports Hall of Fame in February 2000.



He was honored as a football coach, community and sports organizer, and "can-do" motivator to the youth and residents of Brunswick. His success launching football at the high school and youth levels in Brunswick inspired other Frederick County communities to develop community and high school football programs at a time when school officials wished to limit interscholastic football to the two Frederick City high schools. His Hall of Fame plaque describes him as the "father of county football."

During the 1960s, Daugherty launched the Brunswick High School Booster Program to raise money for Railroader sports programs and athletic

facility improvements. In 1968, after overcoming significant resistance from Frederick County Public School officials, he organized and coached the first Brunswick High School football team. During his seven-year tenure as head coach, he developed ninth grade and JV programs to support the varsity team and supported the community's efforts in developing a youth feeder program. The Brunswick Jr. Railroaders continue to honor his contributions by giving an annual Herb L. Daugherty Sr. Award to one of its program's better players.

As a football coach, he was known for building teams that played strong defense. Prior to the 1969 season, his second year guiding the Railroader program, the Herald-Mail of Hagerstown queried him about his strategy for preparing his team for the new season, and quoted him as saying, "Defense is much easier to teach than offense."

But his truly significant contributions were in doing all of the other things necessary to establish the game he loved in Brunswick. He raised money; he organized community support; he challenged the administrative and political structures of his day; he labored to improve the athletic facilities in his community; and he promoted Brunswick, its youth, and its schools. And his success inspired others in other communities to do the same.

Stan Goldberg, former Frederick News-Post Sports Editor, wrote that "Daugherty would not be stopped" in a September 4, 2011, column about how Brunswick High School

obtained its first stadium lights 40 years before and just three years after the program began. In the same article, he writes, "All of this reminds me just how much Frederick County football owes to the late Brunswick coach."

Herb L. Daugherty Sr., the "can-do man," truly is the "father of county football."

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Chuck Foreman: 1970s' Best All-Around Running Back One of Frederick's Best

When Frederick's Chuck Foreman was traded from Minnesota to New England following the 1979 NFL season, Vikings coach Bud Grant was asked about the star running back's seven-year career with his team.

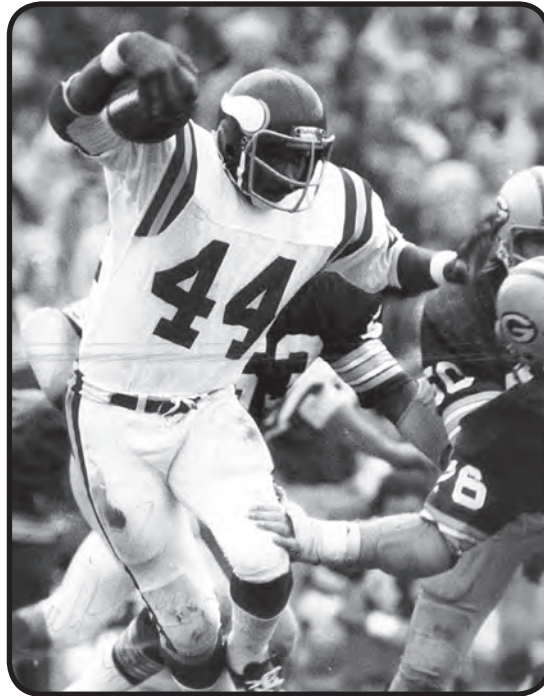
"There's no doubt that Chuck was the best all-around running back in football," Grant said. "We built our offense around him." The Vikings played in three Super Bowls during Foreman's years with them, and Grant said Foreman "had as much to do with our success as anyone."

The 6-foot-2, 210 pound 1969 Frederick High School graduate was certainly the most versatile running back in the NFL in the 1970s, adept at both running and catching the football. It seemed like on every play quarterback Fran Tarkenton was either handing the football off to Foreman or throwing it to him. Foreman played in Super Bowl VIII, Super Bowl IX, and Super Bowl XI. Minnesota lost all three games.

Foreman, who was voted into the Alvin G. Quinn Hall of Fame in 1981, rushed for 5,950 yards on 1,556 carries (a 3.8 average per run) in his seven years with the Vikings. He also caught 350 passes for 3,156 yards. Overall, he accounted for 9,106 total yards and 76 touchdowns, 53 rushing and 23 passing. He had three straight 1,000 rushing seasons from 1975 to 1977, a time when teams played just 14 games.

In 1975 Foreman led the league in receptions with 73, then a record for a running back. He rushed for 1,070 yards, second best in the NFL. He scored 22 touchdowns that year. Overall, he accounted for 1761 total yards in 1975, 1722 in 1976 and 1420 in 1977.

He was named NFC Player of the Year by The Sporting



News in 1974 and by UPI in 1976. He was also a four-time All-Pro.

But Foreman's body could not keep up the constant pounding. In 1978 he suffered a knee injury that slowed him down. The next year he rushed for just 223 yards and lost his starting job to Ted Brown. In 1980 he was traded to New England, where he gained just 63 yards and caught 14 passes. That was his last year in the NFL. He was 30 years old.

But the Vikings didn't forget him. In 2007 he was named to the Vikings' "Ring of Honor." He also had the honor of seeing his son Jay, play

linebacker in the NFL from 1999 to 2006.

Making his way to the Vikings' team began when Foreman was an all-around athlete at Frederick in the late 1960s. He went to the University of Miami where he played running back, defensive back and wide receiver. In his junior year in 1971 he gained 966 yards rushing. His big break came in 1973 when he was named MVP of the Senior Bowl.

The Vikings liked what they saw and made him their first round pick in the 1973 draft (the 12th pick overall). It didn't take long for him to impress the coaches. He earned a starting job his first year and rushed for 801 yards and caught 37 passes for 362 yards. He was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

Foreman no longer lives in the area, but frequently comes here to visit his family. In 2014 a field at Ballenger Creek Park was named in his honor. Recently, a commemorative golden football was sent to Frederick High School in honor of his participation in three Super Bowls.

Frederick Players in the Big Show

Quinn Essentials readers will recall Stan Goldberg's article in the July 2016 issue featuring Charles "King Kong" Keller, an inductee of the initial Class of 1977 Alvin Quinn YMCA Sports Hall of Fame. He had an outstanding major league baseball career playing with the New York Yankees from 1939 to 1952 (two of those years Keller played with the Detroit Tigers). Keller, who hailed from Middletown, broke into the majors when he was just 22 years old and then played the outfield on one of the most dominant teams in baseball.

Certainly he is the most famous of Frederick County baseball players who made it to the highest level of play. But did you know that there were 13 other players from Frederick County who made it to the "big show"? True, some only played for a brief stint (two innings). Others played for several years. Thanks to www.baseball-almanac.com, we can retrieve the statistics of players all the way back to the late 1800s to find out who played and how they did.

HERE ARE THE RESULTS:

Ted Beard

Ted was born in Woodsboro and played from 1948 to 1958 in 194 total games as an outfielder with the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Chicago White Sox. His best year was in 1950 when he played in 62 games and batted .232 in 177 plate appearances.

Harry Colliflower

Born in Petersville, just outside of Rosemont, Colliflower pitched in 14 games for the Cleveland Spiders in 1899. He was 1–11 with an 8.17 era.

Ray Gardner

Gardner, a Frederick native, played for the Cleveland Indians in 1929 and 1930. Over the two years, he appeared in 115 games, playing shortstop and third base.

Tom Gettinger

Born in Frederick, Gettinger appeared in 127 games in the majors from 1889 to 1895. The outfielder, sometimes pitcher, played for the Louisville Colonels and the St. Louis Browns. In 1895 he batted .269, his best year.

Sam Hinds

Although Sam was born in Frederick, he played high school baseball in California. After pitching in junior college, he pitched in 29 games with the Milwaukee Brewers in 1977. The reliever posted an 0–3 record and an era of 4.73.

Charles Keller

Two interesting factoids about the Middletown masher were that he appeared in All-Star games in 1940, '41, and '46. At 22 years old in his rookie season in 1939, he batted .334.

Hal Keller

Hal, also of Middletown, played three seasons with the Washington Senators from 1949 to 1952. He was a catcher and played in 22 games before he later became a baseball executive.

Don Loun

Don was a Frederick High School graduate and pitched two games with the Washington Senators in 1964. He had a 1–1 record and a 2.08 era.

Carlton Molesworth

Molesworth, born in Frederick, broke in the majors as a 19-year-old pitcher with the Washington Senators in 1895. He started three games and was 0–2.

Bert Myers

Myers, born in Frederick, played for three major league clubs from 1896 to 1900. The third baseman/shortstop appeared in 160 games for the St. Louis Browns, Washington Senators, and the Philadelphia Phillies and had a lifetime batting average of .253.

Emory Nusz

In 1884, Emory, a Frederick native, played in one game with the Washington ball club as an outfielder.

Dorsey Riddlemoser

Dorsey of Frederick pitched a total of two innings with Washington in 1899.

Archie Stimmel

Stimmel was from Woodsboro and pitched for the Cincinnati Reds from 1900 to 1902. In 26 games he had a 5–19 record and a 4.21 era.

Art Stokes

Art, an Emmitsburg native, pitched in 12 games with the Philadelphia Athletics from 1900 to 1902. He was 1–1, with a 4.07 era.



Remembering 1966.....A look at some of the Quinn Hall of Famers making the sports news from 50 years ago

If you happened to live in Frederick in the fall of 1966, you might have been able to see a pre-season NBA game played in the Gov. Thomas Johnson High gym between the Baltimore Bullets and the New York Knickerbockers. You might have traveled down to Baltimore to see a Baltimore Colts team led by quarterback Johnny Unitas. If you were lucky, you got to see the Orioles sweep the World Series in four games. But for local sports fans, there was plenty of news being made by some of Frederick County's future inductees into the Alvin Quinn YMCA Sports Hall of Fame. Thanks to the archives at the Frederick News Post, we can look back on a few of those shining moments by some of Frederick's finest.

.....
September 1 – Former Walkersville graduate, the left-hander Dick Smith ended his professional baseball playing career by pitching three innings for the AAA Durham Bulls. Smith was the general manager of the Bulls at the time. Originally signed by the Philadelphia Phillies with a \$90,000 signing bonus, Smith had served three years as a baseball executive for both the Phillies and Houston Astros organizations. Dick was a 1985 Quinn Hall of Fame inductee.

.....
September 6 – In the first game of the best of three playoff games of the Maryland State League (baseball), Gordon Smith of the Walkersville squad collected three hits, including a double and a home run in their loss to Germantown. Gordon was a 1979 Quinn Hall of Fame inductee.

.....
September 24 – The Gov. Thomas Johnson High School Patriot football team in its inaugural season defeated Andover High School 27–13 for its third straight win. The Patriots were coached by Quinn Hall of Fame 1983 inductee Jack Molesworth. Meanwhile, the Frederick Cadets were beating Boonsboro 26–7, thanks to a stellar performance by end Chuck Foreman, who caught seven passes for 169 yards, including a 75-yard touchdown. Chuck was a 1981 Quinn inductee.

.....
October 29 – The Frederick High football team collected its fifth consecutive win in a 20–14 victory over Howard High. Future Quinn Hall of Famer Stan Biggus (class of 2015) was sighted for his outstanding defensive play.

.....
November 5 – The Middletown High School soccer team prepared to meet Williamsport in the first game of the district playoffs. The Knights were undefeated at the time.



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How to Nominate Candidates to the Alvin G. Quinn Sports Hall of Fame

The Alvin G. Quinn Sports Hall of Fame Committee is always looking for potential candidates for the Hall of Fame. If you would like to nominate an athlete, coach, or booster, first review the following criteria for nomination:

- The candidate, by his/her accomplishments and contributions in the field of athletics, has brought honor to self and to Frederick County.
- The candidate resided in Frederick County for not less than five years prior to his/her accomplishments.
- The candidate is retired from active participation in athletics for at least three years or has participated in his/her athletic endeavor for at least ten years.
- The candidate must have excelled as an individual (Note: teams are not eligible collectively).
- The candidate must be at least 21 years of age.
- The candidate may be deceased.

Nominations must be made on the "Application for Nomination" included in this newsletter or found on the website of the YMCA of Frederick County. Submissions received from now through August 2017 will be considered for the HOF Class of 2018. 5. A candidate shall be at least twenty-one years of age.
6. Candidates who meet all qualification, but are deceased, are eligible for memberships.
